# **Message from Pastor Greg - "Seeing Beyond the Horizon"**

I was fascinated to see in a recent news article that the "flat earth" theory persists in modern times, in spite of millennia of human thought and experience to the contrary. (Yes, the article was "click bait," but it still caused me to look up the interesting and informative Wikipedia article on "Flat Earth.") From my perspective, the idea that the earth is flat is, of course, an inaccurate and outdated notion from very ancient times, but maybe it does make us think about the difficulty we all have seeing beyond the horizon.

At this time of year, when Spring has not yet sprung and our PNW skies largely persist being gray, I too have trouble at times seeing over the horizon. In church calendar terms, it is hard to see all the way from Ash Wednesday to Easter. Is this true for you, too? Are there seasons in our lives of faith when our vision is clouded? Do we see only the ash heap of our brokenness and not the flourishing life of Jesus' empty tomb?

Into that experience, God speaks (Hebrews 11:1-3): "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see. This is what the ancients were commended for. By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible." In other words, following Jesus in faith always means moving forward to explore what we do not yet see. We do this in the confident hope of what has been seen by believers who have gone before us.

As we sail through the often dark clouds of Lent, can we do it with the fresh wind of Easter in our sails? As we Cordatans move into the future God has for us, with its inherent uncertainties and possibilities, can we do it with the confident hope of faith in Christ? Our risen Lord has promised to meet us wherever we go. Let's go look for Him together.

Here in western Washington, we have lots of experience with clouds, especially this time of year. Recently, in reviewing my images, I found this one. Here, the sky (clouds included) is not just background for a picture of majestic mountains or towering evergreens. Instead, the sky has interest of its own.

Why do you suppose God sends clouds? Could He send them just for our entertainment? Maybe. They certainly are fun to watch, and I'm pretty sure God likes to see us enjoy His creation. Could it be that the purpose of clouds is to remind us to appreciate the sunny days? Can they just be part of His scheme for the natural world? Washington State's economy depends heavily on agriculture - blueberries, strawberries, raspberries, apples, cherries - so we can all be thankful He sends rain for those luscious fruits. Not all clouds bring rain, however.

Of course, scripture has plenty of cloud references. One of my favorites is found in the next-to-last book of the Bible. Speaking of false teachers, Jude says:

[False teachers] are spots in your love feasts, while they feast with you without fear, serving only themselves. They are clouds without water, carried about by the winds; late autumn trees without fruit, twice dead, pulled up by the roots; raging waves of the sea, foaming up their own shame; wandering stars, for whom is reserved the blackness of darkness forever (Jude 12-14, NKJV).

Vivid imagery, powerful words. Avoiding false teachers remains a challenge for Christians in today's world. We know there is one place we can go to find words that are unfailingly true, however. God's word, whether we find it in the Bible or in prayer, will not fail us. We know that today's quandaries will be resolved, in time, as long as we keep our eyes on the eternal. As Christians, we expect to find our eternal home in a place with no clouds of any sort. Naturally, I have a song reference for this. I first heard it from Willie Nelson, but it's actually an old gospel hymn:

Oh, they tell me of a home far beyond the skies

Oh, they tell me of a home far away

Oh, they tell me of a home where no storm clouds rise

Oh, they tell me of an uncloudy day.

## **Sunday Morning Adult Bible Study Underway**

It's not too late to join the Sunday morning adult education class at 9a in the Chapel. This Lenten series, titled "Grasping the Gospels," continues through Palm Sunday, April 2. In this class, retired Pastor Gordon Terpstra leads participants into a deeper understanding of the four wonderful Gospels that begin the New Testament.

Gordon describes the class as follows: "We have likely heard many parts of the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John numerous times. We can easily think we know all about them. But do we? Do we understand why there are four accounts of the Gospel of Jesus instead of just one? Do we know why God wrote the story of Jesus from four different angles instead of a simpler single angle? Do we grasp how each Gospel differs markedly from the other three, and why these differences are crucial? Do we appreciate how each one of the four is literarily constructed in such a unique way that they paint Jesus in four unique colors instead of one color? In short, when we read the Gospels do we come away with a full, four-dimensional portrait of Who our Lord and Savior really is or just a truncated one dimensional portrait?"

Last Fall Gordon led a class on the Psalms. It was not a class on any individual Psalm but rather an overview of how to read and understand all 150 Psalms as a whole. This new class is similar in that it is not a detailed study of one Gospel but an overview on how to read and understand the fullness of all four Gospels as they are compared and contrasted with one another.

You are warmly invited to attend, to learn, and to grow in grasping the wonder of how God orchestrated such a marvelous four-dimensional picture of His Son!
