Message from Pastor Greg: "Faith to Move Mountains"

I recently hopped on an opportunity to spend a couple days backpacking deep into the beautiful wilds of the nearby North Cascades. The occasion was a "Space for God" retreat led by our friend Mike Neelley (who you likely remember from his occasional guest preaching at CPC). The other four guys and I experienced God's creative beauty and presence together in that unique setting. This time away

brought me several significant insights and encouragements about the nature of God and about following Jesus, and I want to share those with you. One of these insights I already mentioned in a "Cliff's notes" way at the close of a recent worship service, but I want to flesh it out here in hopes it will move you, too.

Our trek took us up 2,550 feet in elevation gain from where we parked on a dirt road about 8 miles from Glacier, WA, on a trail called Yellow Aster Butte. On Day 2, the mist cleared to reveal a stunning view of both Mt. Baker and Mt. Shuksan. We spent unhurried time that morning gazing straight across to the glacial ice and snow fields on Baker. Our group of guys shared some Scripture reading together, then we each went off for some solo time of prayer. It was during that time that I experienced what I personally yearn for more than anything - the strange warmth of heart that I've come to know signals the presence of God's Holy Spirit. This is a rare experience for me personally, and I know that many people cannot relate to it (others experience the Holy Spirit much more regularly than I do). It was rich, peace-filled time and I find myself in the weeks since praying that God will pour out His presence in that same way for all of us at CPC.

In the wake of this experience, I found myself reflecting on the nature of faith. As I preached recently (September 24), faith is certainly an antidote to fear. But I often find myself thinking that faith is something that I generate by my own power, telling myself to run faster and jump higher spiritually so that my faith will grow. At Yellow Aster Butte, God gave me a different vision. What if faith is given by God and our role is simply to cooperate in receiving it? Jesus said (Matthew 17:20): "Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." The tiniest increment of faith on our part can and does have the most impossible impact. Maybe some of you agree with my gripe that "progress" in our life of faith sometimes seems glacially slow, but after my time with God, I think that might be exactly the point. If God can carve the North Cascades by slow-moving sheets of ice floating on the thinnest layer of water (melted ice), maybe even the slightest warming of our hearts will also move mountains.

This Beacon and our weekly Sunday bulletins highlight numerous small ways each of us can join together on the faith-building, mountain-moving journey with Jesus. Come and take part!

So, the little black lamb stands on his mom for security. We have a better plan – standing on the promises of God.

We will see that each miracle was done out of compassion for people, but also to prove that He is the Son of God.

Key Passage: John 1:18

Meet CPC's New Worship Director - Sarah Allen

Church and music have always been a part of Sarah Allen's life. Her mother was from a missionary family and throughout Sarah's early years her family regularly attended Christ Chapel Bible Church in Fort Worth.

Sarah's music education began when she began taking piano lessons at the age of 6 and continued throughout her elementary, middle, and high school years and into college. Sarah studied music at Samford University in Birmingham, AL, a university rooted in Christian mission where she was a Scholarship Singer performing at various churches in the area. After earning her B.A., Sarah continued her study at Texas Christian University (TCU) in Fort Worth, TX, where she earned two Master of Arts degrees - M.A. in composition and M.A. in music education. While working on her Master's degree in music education, she served as Director of

Children's Music at Canyon Creek Presbyterian Church in Richardson, TX. Then last year, she served as Associate Choir Director at Sachse High School. She also taught both piano and voice lessons privately.

Sarah also composes and arranges both choral and instrumental music, and her compositions are inspired by various topics, including scripture, poetry and life experiences. She has been commissioned to write choral pieces and one special composition was based on a Bible verse for a friend's wedding. For her M.A. in music composition, she drew upon her love of visiting national parks to compose a piece in which the movements were based upon her memories of different rock formations in Arches National Park.

Music was even a part of Sarah's finding the love of her life - her husband Mehrdad Gholami. Mehrdad was finishing his doctorate in woodwind performance at TCU when they met, and he encouraged her as she applied and entered the Master's program. She laughingly relates that on their first date, they only talked about music. When she returned home and was asked by her parents about her date, she could only tell them about their conversations about music. Mehrdad is also interested in music education. While serving as an adjunct professor at The Texas A&M University at Commerce and a sabbatical replacement professor at TCU, he taught music to middle and high school students in the Dallas/Fort Worth area and has already visited schools in Bellingham as a recruitment effort for his new position at Western Washington University.

As Mehrdad was applying for jobs, he and Sarah knew nothing about Bellingham, but they were looking for a change. As they began researching our city, they were stunned by the gorgeous countryside and the weather. Sarah was concerned that if she got too invested in coming to Bellingham, she would be crushed if it didn't work out. However, God seemed to have Bellingham in His plan for Sarah and Mehrdad. In addition to Mehrdad getting a position at WWU, Sarah was offered a teaching job at Carl Cozier Elementary School, and she found our position online. Sarah states that when she went to our website, it felt like home, because it looked like her home church's site.

For fun, Sarah enjoys hiking (and was impressed with the number and variety of hiking trails in our area), running, and spending time with her husband. Sarah and Mehrdad are film buffs, so they were happy to find an independent theater (the Pickford) here, and they enjoy travel, especially road trips to national parks.

When asked what might surprise others to know about her, Sarah replied that in her early years she struggled with dyslexia. When her 3 siblings entered private school, they all passed the entrance exam on the first try. Sarah failed her first attempt but was offered a second opportunity at the end of the summer to retake the test. She studied all summer and passed the test. That hard work early in life was a good lesson that has paid off.

Sarah is excited to be a part of the congregation and is looking forward to getting to know everyone. She has felt very welcomed and has appreciated the kindness and encouragement she has received. Sarah, we're excited to have you as a part of our congregation and look forward to worshiping and singing with you each Sunday.
