Message from Pastor Greg: "The Third Way"

Our two party U.S. political system might lead us to conclude that there are only two defining choices available to us--Republican or Democrat, conservative or progressive, or some other binary pair. But the Bible and the history of the Church reveal that there is another way. In his book, *Resilient Faith*, Gerald L. Sittser, professor of theology at Whitworth University, describes the "Third Way" that emerged in the early days of the Christian movement. While the "Third Way"




was, of course, not a political party, it was an entirely new way of living that touched on every aspect of human life. In the 2nd Century, a Roman official, describing the peculiar nature of Christianity to a member of the Roman elite, said that Christians represented a new and distinct people, defined by a particular way of living (which Sittser names the "Third Way"). At the time, the "first way" was Roman, organized around civil religion (civic life and religious life were virtually inseparable in the Roman world). The Roman way was largely transactional; honor paid to the gods was expected to bring benefits in return, especially to the Empire. Sittser says, "In the end, Rome's religion was Rome itself." The "second way" was Judaism, an ancient religion quite distinct from the Roman; Jews observed a way of life that set them apart. And then emerged the Christians, who appeared to live like everyone else (same language, food, clothing, customs, etc.) but nevertheless embodied not just a different religion (three in one God), but also a different way of life, a "Third Way."

What made Christians different? According to Sittser, Christians "believed in the reality of another and greater kingdom over which God ruled. It was a spiritual kingdom—not of this world, but certainly over this world as superior and supreme, for this world's redemption, and in this world as a force for ultimate and eternal good. . . . The Third Way was like a resistance movement, both subversive and peaceful, bearing witness to God's coming kingdom. But rather than following a strategy of violent revolution, . . . Christians immersed themselves in the culture as agents of the Kingdom. Christians aspired to follow another way, Jesus' way. They prayed for the Emperor but refused to worship him."

This Fall at CPC, we are exploring the implications of our call to live this "Third Way." We have explored what fruitfulness looks like in our lives, so we can better embrace God's version (rather than the world's version) of such things as wisdom, freedom, grace, and good deeds (always in response to God's grace in Jesus Christ). In November, we will look at what Kingdom unity looks like, as a Third Way antidote to political divisiveness. And we will explore generosity through the lens of our 2025 Generosity campaign, called "Joining Jesus' Journey" (see article on page 2). This means we hold a different view of money. Because, in Christ, we are new creations, we follow Jesus' way, in which the Spirit's gift of generosity becomes our attitude towards our giving and finances. We no longer see money in worldly ways (e.g. as our ultimate security, source of happiness, a means to power and control), but instead as God's blessing and an opportunity to join in God's Kingdom activity in the world. I'm so grateful that God has called us all together to join Jesus on this "Third Way" journey at CPC.

Resilient Church Task Force Update

The Resilient Church Task Force continued its work in October. We hosted a "thank you" dinner for the congregation's "journal writers" for their time and effort to record their observations of numerous church events. Special thanks to Stephany Kuhn and Barbara Sanford for their wonderful chili! We anticipate receiving the analysis of the journal entries from our Whitworth University consultant in about two weeks.

In addition, we viewed a webinar featuring theology professor and author Gerald L. Sittser. Some of the major points included:

- The first century Christian church grew, despite the competing pressures of the Roman and Jewish cultures at the time.
- A primary reason for the growth was that early Christianity created a "long on-ramp into the life of the church." This on-ramp was highly relational and was a mentoring program that introduced people to this new way of believing and new way of living.
- We're in a transitional period in American religion. Christianity is losing its place in Western culture.
- Sittser recommend we develop a new "long on-ramp" to foster a culture of discipleship in our churches. Worship should be a way of life, not just showing up on Sunday morning.

Trees! Aren't they gorgeous? The trees along Cordata Parkway have been particularly brilliant this year. I appreciate that the ones in the median have been bright red, a wonderful contrast to the dazzling yellow ones on the sides of the road. Although many of the leaves have fallen by now, here in the Evergreen State we can be thankful for the winter beauty of our 200-foot-tall Western Cedar, Douglas Fir, and Western Hemlocks around town.



You may wonder how I took this photo with its elevated perspective. I'm not much of a tree climber, and I don't have a drone. You would naturally think the bright blue background is a cloudless sky, but it's not. I took this photo when I was hiking above Crater Lake, looking down through the trees at the water. Interesting how a change in perspective can challenge our assumptions, isn't it?

Tree lovers will enjoy a song from the 1950s that I love. Despite its cheery lightheartedness, the message is powerful. Perhaps it will bring a chuckle to you and brighten your day.

On your knees you are taller than trees. You can look over heartaches and fears. When my faith is gone, To my knees I will go, Growing stronger and taller than trees.

Of course, in the Pacific Northwest, among our beloved majestic evergreens, it's hard to imagine actually being taller than the trees, but this fall as you are out walking, or sightseeing, or just doing errands, think of the song and remember where we can go when we need to feel big and strong:

Fear not, for I am with you; Be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, Yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand. (Isaiah 41:10)

But that's not the end of the story. Once we get to our knees, how do we know what to ask for? Strength, of course is always welcome. Comfort also, guidance as well. Sometimes I'm tempted to just say "Dear Heavenly Father, I crave your presence. I don't know exactly what I need, but I know you do". That sounds a bit lazy, though, and I doubt God would find such a prayer very satisfying. Regardless how clumsy our prayers may be, we can rest in the assurance that He hears and cares and answers, in His time, in His way. Scripture admonishes:

Let the heavens rejoice, and let the earth be glad; Let the sea roar, and all its fullness; Let the field be joyful, and all that is in it. Then all the trees of the woods will rejoice before the Lord. For He is coming, for He is coming to judge the earth. He shall judge the world with righteousness, And the peoples with his truth. (Psalm 96:11-13)

Let us remember this Thanksgiving month to express our gratitude for all the beautiful trees, both deciduous and evergreen, our God has given us.


Inspiring Classes Ahead in Adult Education, Sunday, 9a



Hans Erchinger-Davis to Speak at Together Tuesday on November 12

We are very excited to announce that Hans Erchinger-Davis, President and CEO of the Lighthouse Mission Ministries, will be the speaker at our next Together Tuesday on November 12. This ministry has been supported by our church for many years and Hans' many inspirational stories have always been a blessing to those who hear them.

The mission statement of the Lighthouse Mission Ministries is: "Healing homelessness with Christ's power and love." Their aim is "to be a consistent friend to people in homelessness. This is done through four distinct programs that come alongside people, wherever they are at, to offer hope, give dignity, serve, and support as they undertake the difficult work of leaving homelessness behind."

As usual, we start at 5.30p, and a donation of \$7 towards the meal is greatly appreciated. Please RSVP at the information table in the foyer so that we will know how much food to prepare.

It will be an inspiring evening; we hope you will join us!

How Does the CPC Food Pantry Work?

Our church has now been offering free food for THREE years! The service has a nick name – "Pop up Pantry". Almost every week throughout the year we host some 20 to 30 guests and families for packaged foods, fruits, and vegetables. It usually takes 2 drivers to bring the groceries from the Ferndale warehouse and 3 to 4 hosts to set items out—a total 5 to 6 people helping each Friday.

In sum, this means 300 volunteers over 50 Fridays per year and nearly 1,250 individuals or families taking advantage of these free groceries each year! Anyone - neighbors and congregational members - are welcome to come, and sometimes left over items are useful for our own CPC events. Full usage is encouraged, as otherwise perishables might have to go to the pigs. Open hours Friday are 2:30-4p.

The groceries are collected by the county-wide organization Miracle Food Network based in Ferndale, and set aside for pick up by distributors such as Cordata Pres. Miracle Food Network hauls in the food items from stores, producers, even fast food restaurants who have surpluses that can be used safely by consumers. CPC members Gregg Block and Stan Humphreys are currently CPC coordinators for the Cordata Food Pantry, replacing our long-time, faithful Pantry Organizer, Rich Emerson.

Cordata's Missions and Outreach Committee is hoping to begin sustaining support for the Miracle Food Network's gas and rental costs soon. Also, we would like to see a sharing cart available Sundays for food that folks are happy to share.

Each week different volunteer groups such as our CPC small groups are appointed to help, but any volunteer can find a place. We are grateful that God has given us this opportunity to share with each other and our neighbors.


