## Message from Pastor Greg: "Love One Another" Thursday

Holy Week is right around the corner. Starting on April 13th, we will kick off the eight day celebration of Jesus' completing his earthly mission—from his entry into Jerusalem to the growing unrest of that Passover week, to his sacrificial death on a cross as he became the lamb who was slain for our sake, to his resurrection to new life on Easter Sunday morning. This is the special week of the year when Christ's church gathers to tell that old, old story. So, grab your calendar and save the dates:

Thursday, April 17th – Maundy Thursday (6:00p @ CPC, simple soup and bread dinner provided)
Friday, April 18th – Good Friday (7:30p @ First Presbyterian Church)
Sunday, April 20th – Easter Sunday (9:30a Easter breakfast, 10:30a Worship, 11:30a Egg Hunt)

Let me fill you in about our Maundy Thursday service, since we'll be doing something fun and new for that gathering this year. As usual, we're including all 4 Bellingham Presby' congregations: Cordata Pres., First Pres., St. James Pres., and Spring Church. But instead of meeting in the Worship Center and sitting in the church pews, we'll gather around round tables in the Foyer. We'll enjoy fellowship with sisters and brothers in Christ from other congregations over a simple but tasty dinner (soup and bread...with also a PB&J option for variety). In this way, we'll hear and recreate that last supper Jesus had with his disciples, telling them to "love one another as I have loved you."

Yes, we'll do some usual worship stuff, like praying & singing together, hearing Scripture and a message, communion, choir...but this "Love One Another" feast will feel different this year—still holy but more relaxed. I'm confident it will be time well spent together.

## **All Stirred Up**By Carol Lawrence

This life-size sculpture of a group of men is nestled beside the Santa Cruz River in Tucson, Arizona. The white plaster figures were created by Felix Lucero, in fulfillment of a promise he made to God. Critically wounded and left for dead on a World War I battlefield, Lucero promised God to devote his life to sculpting religious figures. Few details about his postwar life are known, but apparently during his work on this project he was destitute and living in a tent beside the river. He shaped the figures from debris salvaged from the river, then covered them in plaster and painted them white. The large tabletop was made



from a mattress that floated down the river. The little park is called the Garden of Gethsemane, and a sculpture of Christ on the cross stands nearby. The city maintains the park, which includes a single outlet that provides electricity for the homeless.

For Lucero, the sculptures were all he could do to thank God for what God had done for Him. This time of year, as Easter approaches, we are reminded of the great love of our God who gave His only son for us. What can we do in return? As always, Scripture gives us the answer: *And let us consider one another in order to stir up love and good works* (Hebrews 10:24).

My study Bible notes that the phrase *stir up* is translated from the Greek word *paroxysm*, which means uncontrollable outburst. I can't think of a better thing to get stirred up about than love for each other and good works.

### **Resilient Church Initiative**

Approximately 50 congregation members gathered after worship on March 9 for "round-table" discussions on the Resilient Church Initiative. We addressed these questions:

- What are some ways in the past where God worked in your life through CPC (or another church)? Can you be specific?
- How do you see God at work in your life now through CPC and its ministries?
- What do you hope God will do at CPC in the future?
- If you could say anything to the leadership of CPC, what would you say?

We thank all who participated for their valuable insights. The Resilient Church Task Force is now in the process of reviewing and assessing all of the information gathered. We expect to have a summary available for all by the end of April.

In mid-March three members of our task force, Dan Sanford, Rich Emerson, and Greg Ellis, attended a Resilient Church retreat near Spokane with representatives of seven other churches present. This was an opportunity to learn what ideas are emerging in the other participating churches and to get suggestions regarding what is developing at CPC. A central part of the meeting was a workshop led by Boris Borislav, a specialist in urban planning and church planting. After studying a satellite map of Cordata's neighborhood, we began exploring the multiple avenues to building relationships and extending outreach to our nearby community. Aside from knowing where and how to connect, we began discussion around the question, "How can we be best equipped to respond to God's call to be relational missionaries in our neighborhood?"

Some of the additional topics addressed were related to the future generation: How do we effectively communicate? How do we engage those who are worshipping with us at a distance? What will be the culture and method of financial giving in the future? And many other questions. We hope to report more fully about these topics in the coming months.

## **CPC Kids Clubhouse Catch Up**

**CPC Kids Clubhouse -** We completed our 3-month study in the book of Genesis on March 30th. So many familiar Bible stories are found and loved in that book. A big take away is how the story shifts from people to God's people.

April lessons begin with the story of Job and how God is good even in suffering. This lesson of suffering is a good one to help lead into Holy Week lessons and Easter. After Easter Sunday, we resume

our study plan with Volume 2 "Law and Life: Exodus—Deuteronomy". The first unit in Volume 2 is titled "God Delivers His People". The stories about Moses and the Israelites will keep us engaged all month.

**Holy Week Family Devotional** - In addition to the 40-day Lenten Devotional packets handed out prior to Ash Wednesday, we also have a Holy Week devotional for families. The packets have an easy-to-follow daily study guide plus a couple of crafts to help the entire families focus on the meaningful events of the Passion. **April 17th, Maundy Thursday Service and Dinner -** We will gather for a simple soup dinner with family friendly worship and communion.



## **Remembering Becky Walstad**

Editor's Note: For those who could not make it to Becky's Celebration of Life on Sunday, March 30th, here is her obituary from www.westfordfuneralhome.com. We will miss her.

Becky Walstad (née Beard), age 72, died of Alzheimer's disease at Highgate Senior Living in Bellingham on Wednesday, March 19, 2025. She was born November 1, 1952, in Bellingham to Bill and Eldora "DoDo" Beard, attended Assumption Catholic School, and was in one of the original graduating classes from Sehome High School in 1971. She received her education and master's degree from WWU and, in 1975, started

work at Roosevelt Elementary followed by a 43-year teaching career at Silver Beach Elementary School.

Becky had many friends and interests, but, above all else, she was a teacher. She taught generations of Silver Beach families and cared deeply for every one of her students, attending their graduations, weddings, and in many cases, teaching their children years later. Becky was active in the Bellingham Education Association, serving on the BEA board and health benefits committee. In addition to teaching, Becky was a founding member of the Sr. Catherine Auxiliary at St. Joseph Hospital, a former Elder and active member of Cordata (Birchwood) Presbyterian Church, and a great neighbor and friend to all.

Becky is survived by her sister, Penny Walden (Randy); niece, Kelly Walden (Ambyr Burrell); nephew, Andy Walden-Montoya; stepdaughter, Katie Walstad Morgan; and her second family, Sue and Phil Sharpe and their daughters, Katie (Adam) Kortlever and Claire (Nate) Card.

Becky was preceded in death by her parents, and her nephew Andy's husband, Mauro.
