Message from Pastor Greg: What's Next?

Isaiah 43:19 says this: "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth. Do you not perceive it?" As the joyful worship of Easter Sunday reminds us, Jesus' Resurrection is the first fruits of the "new thing" God is doing. The Resurrection is at the deep core of our faith, grounding our expectation that God is at work both in the world, in our congregation and in our individual lives. The Resurrection means that we can expect the same kinds of things Jesus' early Disciples experienced. As I preached the Sunday after Easter (from Acts 5), this is a natural season to ask "What's next?". As CPC moves forward in faith, we can expect at least these things:

- 1. **Change.** Did you notice how different the Disciples were after Jesus rose from the dead and ascended to heaven? Disciples became Apostles. Peter, especially, transformed from a roughtalking fisherman who always seems to have his foot in his mouth into an eloquent chief spokesman. How are we changing as we follow Jesus, filled by His Spirit?
- 2. **Proclamation.** Even a brief read of Acts 5 shows that the Disciples/Apostles transformation caused them to be more vocal about Jesus. They were so changed by his Resurrection that they could not stop talking about Him. Even when the authorities instructed them to stop (and flogged them!), they kept on. *Are we willing to take some baby steps to put words to what we notice the Lord doing in our lives?*
- 3. **Opposition/Resistance.** Even a brief read of Acts 5 shows that the Disciples/Apostles enthusiastic embrace of Jesus' mission and His Way had at least two results: (a) people are healed, redeemed, and saved by the Apostles' ministry and (b) the "powers that be" oppose Jesus' mission and Way. Are we prepared for our mission and ministry to be opposed? Have we worked through our own internal resistance to the Lord's changing work in us?
- 4. **Joy.** When the disciples were released by the authorities, after being flogged, they rejoiced. Why? Not because they were relieved to be out of the hands of their tormentors, but because "they had been deemed worthy to suffer for the name of Jesus." Are we willing to put our own personal comfort and interests below God's mission and purposes in the world?

And here's my own personal pastoral "What's Next?" Through some exciting conversations I have been having with CPC's Resilient Church Leadership Team, the Lord is doing a new thing in me: for the next 6 weeks or so (i.e. from now until our June 15th Congregational Meeting), I'm going to try an Easter season experiment. Each Wednesday, I will email the congregation a "Wednesday Word" focusing on (1) our Resilient Church Project and (2) an invitation to Prayer. This seems to me/us as a good way to invite all of CPC into greater awareness and participation in what CPC is learning as we continue further into the Discern phase of the Resilient Church Initiative and prepare for our Congregational Meeting in June. War and Peace

Last summer I was fortunate to take a tour of the Battleship lowa, now retired and berthed in the Port of Los Angeles. The lowa was commissioned in 1943 as the first 45,000-ton class battleship. Each of her engines can generate 53,000 horsepower, the same that could be produced by 154 Corvettes. To provide power, she carried 2,582,000 gallons of fuel, enough to fill 129,100 Corvettes. The original cost of the ship was \$100 million, estimated to be more than \$2.5 billion in today's dollars. Battleships have



now been replaced by ever more sophisticated, and costly, military equipment. This year, the U.S. military budget is capped at \$895 billion.

Of course, the cost of the military is not measured only in dollars. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, since 1775 the U.S. military has recorded 651,031 combat deaths and 539,054 noncombat deaths. This month we celebrate Memorial Day in honor of those brave individuals who have lost their lives in service to our country. Each one is a hero.

War is nothing new. The Old Testament gives us lots of war stories. Lately I've been reading 1 Samuel, in a modern translation. It reads like an action movie, with the repeated battles between the Israelites and the Philistines (1 Samuel 13:15-14:23; 17:1-52; 18:25-27; 21:10-15; 27:1-28:6; 29:1-11; 31:1-13). Seems the Philistines didn't learn their lesson after the shepherd boy David killed their giant Goliath. What about us, in today's world? Have we learned that wars never end?

As Memorial Day approaches, let us reflect on the true cost of war. Much as we might wish for peace in our world, the complexity of the 21st century makes it hard to see a way to achieve it. We must keep in mind that we serve a God of peace. Scripture reminds us:

These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world. (John 16:33)

Naturally, we would prefer to see His overcoming sooner rather than later, but we can remember to use the most powerful weapon we have – prayer.

CPC Staff Member Joins Short-Term Alaska Mission

CPC Assistant for Youth and Children's Ministries, Evangeline Bentley, will be traveling to Alaska this August to join a group of Campus Christian Fellowship students for a mission to Akiak, a village in Alaska. Evangeline is being supported, in part, by a financial gift from the CPC discretionary budget.

She reports that her group will consist of six students and two leaders connected with CCF at Western Washington University. Akiak is a small rural community that has reported some hardships recently. Evangeline knows there will be challenges, but states, "I'm excited to learn about their culture."

During their one week visit, the group will help with children's activities, a Vacation Bible School program similar to what we do at CPC, and/or a basketball camp. As this exciting adventure approaches, let's pray for Evangeline—smooth travels, good health, and effective evangelism.

Palm Sunday Coat Drive Recap -



Did You Know?

How our neighborhood church came to be.

Recently, I was asked how the church decided to minister to this area of North Bellingham. Good question. Our church, previously known as Birchwood Presbyterian Church, outgrew their facilities in the Birchwood neighborhood and at that time was offered a land gift of our current site. The church prayerfully considered this gift, one that would be part of a newly developed neighborhood. Thanking God, we accepted the gift and held two Capital Campaigns selling bonds and accepting pledges to raise funds. We became the first building in this neighborhood!

God Moments - When you take on a big challenge it's important to note the God moments that encourage you forward.

- o The gift of land.
- On the day of groundbreaking when many were gathered in a circle holding hands, a rainbow appeared in the sky also in the shape of a circle right above us!!
- Dut then, a decade after our move, we discovered the materials on the exterior of the building were failing and would have to be replaced. It felt a lot like Jacob working 7 years to marry Rachel only to discover he had been married to Leah and would have to work another 7 years to marry Rachel. But with insurance, sacrificial giving earmarked for the mortgage, and legacy gifts that God provided entirely out of the blue, the financial needs continued to be met.

Footholds - During this time many ministries existed within the church and outreach efforts with the neighborhood were attempted with some success. The church felt stymied with the financial constraints of the mortgage but found ways to move forward, particularly with a playground Presbytery Grant that we applied for and received. That grant began a series of footholds that began to gain us some momentum and staying power with each addition.

- o A playground for the neighborhood families, our church family, and schools we have hosted.
- o The idea of a block party to draw the neighborhood down to our circle was born.
- o Fall Festival a family-oriented fun night.
- o The congregation voted to rename the church Cordata Presbyterian Church to better identify with our mission and location.
- o The church staff made a decision to not schedule annual VBS gatherings (which generally brought in already churched children). Instead, smaller more intimate gatherings aimed directly at our neighborhood children began, and Fun in the Sun came into being during the summer months.
- o Fun in the Sun spring-boarded Clubs 4 Kids on Tuesdays and Thursdays.
- o Little Library Book lending nook was created in the circle drive for families to access free books.
- o The Youth Group is beginning to attract neighborhood youth to attend on Wednesday nights.
- o The Miracle Food Network food pantry provides food every Friday afternoon to the community.

Where God might be leading us next in terms of outreach to our neighbors? CPC has been prayerfully considering if there are partnership opportunities with the Meridian School District that would mutually serve the neighborhood. Recently, one of the social workers for the Meridian School District called and asked if we could once again host English as a Second Language (ESL) for families as we had done in previous years. The Literacy Council is willing to provide the teachers.
