

Message from Pastor Greg: Unexplored Possibilities

Has anyone noticed we're talking a lot about prayer lately? Why is that? The further we go forward following Jesus on this journey of faith together, the more I become convinced that the default setting for many of us (me included) is to try to do things on our own. In terms of living out our faith, "this go-it-alone" habit of ours can certainly feel fruitless and lonely. Jesus explicitly says, *Apart from me, you can do nothing.* (John 15:5) One of the most important learnings coming into focus as we continue our exploration of resiliency (through our two-year Resilient Church Initiative) is that for us to do anything resilient or worthwhile means doing those things in communion with the living God. As the angel Gabriel said to Mary, *With God, nothing is impossible.*

And here is where prayer comes in. The primary mode the *Bible* gives us to act in tandem with God is through prayer. This is why we're exploring the Lord's Prayer in detail during the current summer sermon series and why we're encouraging all CPCers to read and study *The Possibility of Prayer* by John Starke (see display in the foyer and page 4 for more information). Starke reminds us that God's essential character is personal and relational and that God is intimately available through prayer. As Psalm 16 says, *I have set the Lord always before me; because he is at my right hand, I shall not be shaken.* And, *In your presence [Lord], there is fullness of joy; at your right hand are pleasures forevermore.* The spatial logic of that is a bit confusing, but it clearly spells intimacy. As Starke says, *Christ is at my right hand, I am at his. One is for confidence, the other for joy.*


The point is: God is much, much closer and available than we think; and our life of faith and work of ministry together can become infinitely more satisfying, hope-filled, and joyful than it is. All we need is to start acting on the Lord's invitation. It is the Jesus way. Let's lean in and see what happens.




Our Solid Rock By Carol Lawrence

The Lord is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer; my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge, My shield and the horn of my salvation. (2 Samuel 22:2b.3)

It bears saying more than once. He is our rock. It's no mystery why one of my favorite hymns includes the refrain *On Christ the solid Rock I stand.* The rock in this photo is on the coast of Maine. It looks tiny in the context of the rugged coast and crashing surf, just as we may feel small and vulnerable in today's challenging world. The dangers posed by Maine's rocky coast are real. The state has 3,500 miles of coastline and more than 2,000 islands. Its commercial fishing industry supports an estimated 33,000 jobs and provides us all with those delicious Maine lobsters. But it is a dangerous industry. On average, fatal accidents are 100 times more common among fishermen than the average in other industries.







No Summer Slow Down for CPC Missions & Outreach

Our committee is skipping its July meeting, but our directed activities continue onward. Some of us had a chance last month to hear from Doug Robertson, director of the Whatcom Miracle Food Network, regarding prospects for continuation of food deliveries in the coming months. The program is threatened by rising building and operational costs and declining grant funding. Your committee is continuing its regular support for this program and will prayerfully strive to see how individuals may help.

The Committee also voted to send a one-time gift to Whatcom County World Relief for their one Sunday in June funding campaign. This resettlement organization has suffered recently from unexpected Federal cutbacks and needs extraordinary help.

Summer always presents opportunities to see our out-of-country ministry partners. Just last Sunday we were visited by Bryan and Thande Whitlock who are home from South Africa to visit their parents. This month we are anticipating the homecoming of Karen Erickson who has been serving a Christian school in Amman, Jordan.

In mid August, we will welcome Jessica and Zac Gosda, who will soon thereafter leave for assignment in North Africa. Jessica is the granddaughter of our former Birchwood Pres pastor and his wife, Tim and Karen Lann. We will be setting aside an after-worship visit time in the Chapel so stay tuned for the announcement.

The idea of CPC hosting an English Language Learners class in the fall for our non-native English speakers in the neighborhood is still in the feasibility and planning stage. A team of folks have already been gathering suggestions from representatives of the Meridian School District, Whatcom World Relief, and the Whatcom Literacy Council. Of late, there has also emerged a request for us to accommodate the Goodwill Digital Literacy Bus which serves many of the same newcomers to our area. Those who have been exploring this outreach and service possibility include Sharon Chang, Jackie Schoonover, and Carol Lawrence. If you have interest, be sure to let one of these people know.

Big Picture Question: Why should we obey God?


Answer: We should obey, God because He made us, He loves us, and His plans are good.

Melissa studied Business at Sacramento State University and worked for the State of California, Dept. of Finance as an auditor. Tony attended the University of Washington and studied Chemical Engineering. After college, he worked for Procter and Gamble, managing operations in Sacramento. They met at Melissa's home church, the Chinese Community Church in Sacramento.

After Tony received his MBA from Columbia University, they got married and moved to the Bay Area, first to Fremont and then Orinda. Melissa continued to work for the State of California in the Dept. of Public Health in Administration at Berkeley and Richmond. Tony worked for Clorox in Financial and Accounting Departments in Oakland. They were blessed with two children. Sadly, Brandon passed away unexpectantly at 20 from cardiomyopathy. Rachel is currently working in Redmond and living in Seattle.



Stephen A. Greene

On April 18, 2025, Stephen "Steve" Andrew Greene, a follower of Jesus, finished the race well. He will be forever remembered by his beloved wife, Wendy; his children, Luke, Jack, and Elizabeth; and his grandchildren, Elijah, Lydia, Nolan, and Ivy.

Steve was born and raised in Northern California and had a "no quit" attitude that led him to many jobs and careers all over the West Coast. He once disassembled a church and then reassembled it in a new location. This included saving and straightening the nails. His career was marked by dedication and hard work. Steve taught himself to become an energy engineer and went on to manage major projects at Bangor Submarine Base and the Hanford Nuclear Facility.

He had a deep love for anything around water. Sailing was his greatest passion. He loved restoring sail boats and then testing their seaworthiness in Puget Sound. He also enjoyed the peace of fishing and being near the sea. When his draft number was called during the Vietnam War, Steve chose to enlist in the U.S. Navy just weeks after turning 18. He served two tours as a Seabee, deploying with the Marines to build bases in combat zones. Through this, he became a highly skilled craftsman, a talent he would carry with him throughout his life.


Even in retirement, Steve continued to serve others. He worked with Seattle's Union Gospel Mission, training staff in HVAC systems and facilities management. Later, he dedicated his time to volunteering at local food banks, always finding ways to give back to his community.

A lesser-known joy of Steve's was square dancing—something in which he took genuine delight that brought out his fun-loving side.

Steve's quiet faith, resourcefulness, and love for his family defined his life. He will be deeply missed and fondly remembered by all who knew him.
