Peacemakers who sow in peace reap a harvest of righteousness. James 3:18 (NIV)

Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. Galatians 6:9 (NIV)

When [Jesus] saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. Matt. 9:36-38 (NIV)

Don't these verses seem to describe our current life together at Cordata? God has blessed us abundantly with an increase in worshippers; with the recent addition of Andrew as Director for Youth Ministry and Worship Music Director, we are fully staffed for the first time in several years; our Fall kick-off Youth Group meeting had 22 5th thru 9th graders in attendance (20 boys and 2 girls!); our Session, Deacons, and congregation are joyfully engaged in ministry.

Isn't this a lovely path? It's one of many in Bellingham's Cornwall Park—some level and wide; others hilly, narrow, and full of tree roots. The paths wind through the park's 70 acres of majestic evergreens and deciduous trees coming into glorious fall color. Whether I am in the mood for an energetic uphill climb or a casual stroll, I can find it here. For me, it's impossible to be in the park without offering up prayers of praise and thanksgiving to the Creator who has provided such joy.

The Bible has much to say about various types of paths. For some reason I don't understand, or maybe for no reason, I've been reading the book of Proverbs, start to finish. This isn't my usual approach. More often, I'm looking for something short and sweet, a pithy saying that supports what I already think. *Mea culpa*. The book reads well as literature. It's a great example of the 'compare and contrast' structure. Early chapters describe the contrast between the paths of those who *lack wisdom and have left the straight paths to walk in dark ways* (2:13) with the those who find wisdom, whose ways are pleasant ways, and all [her] paths are peace (3:17).



The importance of wisdom shows up again in Ecclesiastes: *God gives wisdom, knowledge, and joy to those who please Him* (2:26, Life Transformation Bible). Of course we all want to please Him. So when we seek wisdom, valuable in itself, we also will receive the joy of knowing we are pleasing Him. As Christians, we know where we can find wisdom, if we remember to look for it:

The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge.

But fools despise wisdom and instruction (Proverbs 1:7).

Let's remember to thank Him for the wisdom He gives, for the life paths he guides us to, and for the glory of the forest paths He has created, right here in Whatcom County. Before I leave to go walk in the woods, I'll close with one more reference to Proverbs:

In all your ways acknowledge Him, And He shall direct your paths (3:5).

Amen.

We hope you'll join us for this memorable evening.


A Report on our Little Library – September, 2025


From January through July, 2025, our Little Library gave away 354 children's books and 110 adult books. Since we began in March of 2022, we have given away 2,394 children's books and 792 adult books for a total of 3,186 books.

But on August 1, 2025, we received notice from Chris Battershill that the door on the library had been ripped off and books had been burned. Yikes! Unfortunately, we had two more incidents during August and made the decision to leave the box empty for things to settle down.

Good News! The Little Library is back! We were so happy to have the Little Library stocked and ready by the day of our Block Party. Many friends and neighbors commented that they loved our Little Library and were glad we could once again share books. It was a good time to celebrate!

The Missions/Outreach Committee has also purchased a library cart so we can share books with Clubs 4 Kids, too. We are always looking for more books, and if you would like to donate, we are accepting new or gently used children's books and adult
